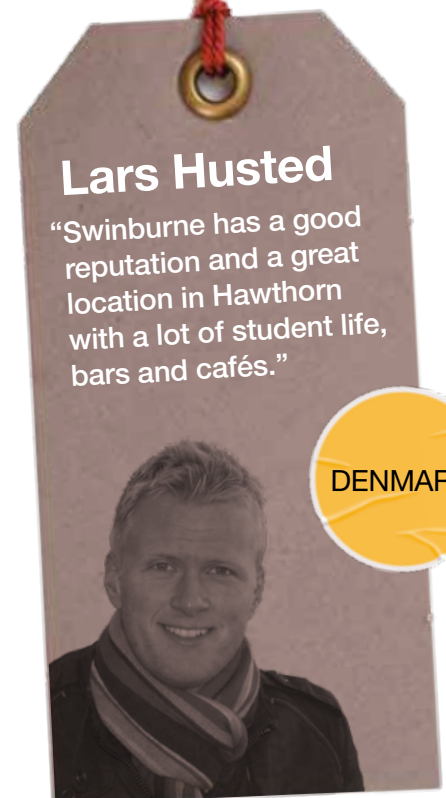

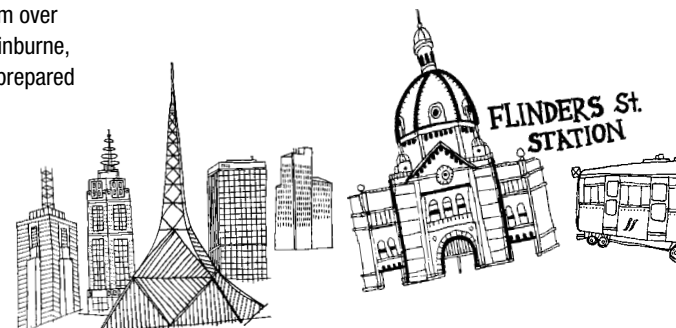

Why Melbourne?

Melbourne is smart, captivating, multicultural, unique, fun, trend-setting and individual. Melbourne is the capital city of the state of Victoria, which is home to 5.4 million people. Melbourne is known as Australia's cultural, culinary and sporting capital. There are numerous ethnic community centres and groups providing fantastic networks for newcomers.

A mild climate, affordable living costs, an extensive public transport network and an abundance of parkland and public space set the scene for a great living experience. Melbourne is a welcoming place where the locals are keen to help you feel at home.

Explore the city and surrounds

In the city centre you can discover hidden laneways and explore grand, tree-lined avenues. Melbourne has many inner-urban villages, each with its own unique flavour. St Kilda offers beaches, clubs, bars and restaurants.

Carlton has an Italian feel with coffee shops, pizzerias, bookshops and an arthouse cinema. Prahran is filled with trendy fashion boutiques. The historic port of Williamstown is perfect for cycling and relaxing on the beach.

Melbourne hosts many festivals, including the International Arts Festival, the Food and Wine Festival and the Melbourne International Comedy Festival. In the city centre you'll find the National Gallery of Victoria and the Australian Centre for the Moving Image (ACMI). There are many other cultural and arts venues within the city, such as the Immigration Museum and the Arts Centre.

Sport is an essential part of Melbourne. Throughout the year Melbourne hosts a variety of major sporting events, including the Australian Tennis Open, the Spring Racing Carnival featuring the Melbourne Cup horse race, the F1 Grand Prix and, of course, international cricket matches and Aussie Rules football matches.

Great Ocean Road Daytrip

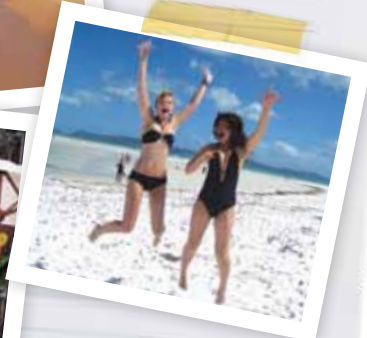

Phillip Island Koalas and Penguins

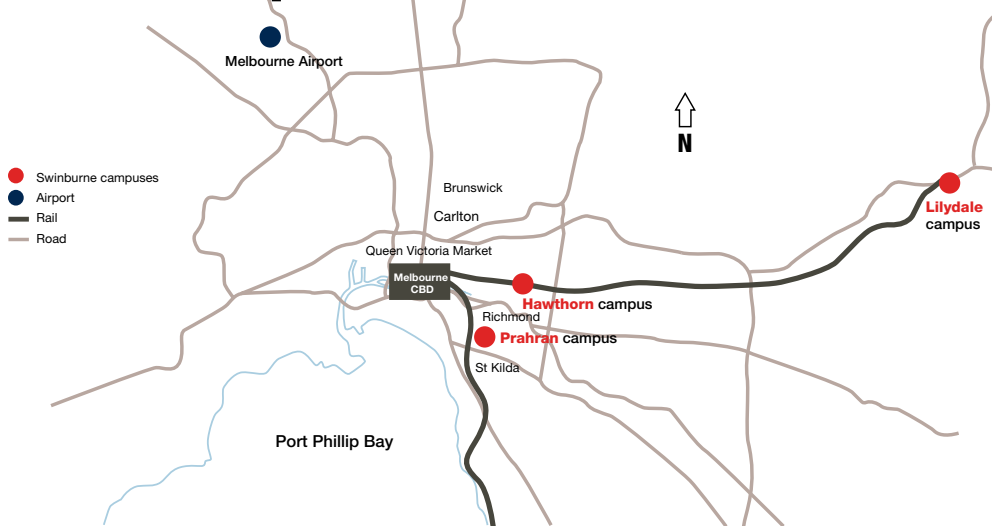
See koalas in their natural habitat at the Conservation Centre. Then head to the Penguin Parade to watch the fairy penguins make their way to their burrows.

Our campuses



Swinburne is made up of five Melbourne campuses and one in Sarawak, Malaysia.

The majority of Swinburne's international students study at our Hawthorn, Lilydale, Prahran and Sarawak campuses. Each campus has quick and easy access to transport, accommodation and shops. All Swinburne campuses have wireless internet access.

Hawthorn campus

14,500 students
8 km from the city
10–15 minutes by train to the city

Our main campus is based in the thriving, inner-city shopping destination of Glenferrie Road, in prosperous Hawthorn. It's set among cafes, banks, boutiques, bookshops, supermarkets, patisseries and restaurants, and is right next to the train station. It is also the hub of our research and development activities.

Accommodation

Accommodate your learning

The campus you study at will depend on what units (subjects) you choose. Studying between campuses is possible (timetable permitting). You would need to be prepared to travel at least 30 minutes by train between Hawthorn and Prahran; or an hour between Lilydale and Hawthorn.

UniLodge @ Swinburne Place (Hawthorn)

UniLodge features fully furnished apartments. Prices (including utilities) for multi-share apartments start at A\$199 per week, and studios from A\$299 per week. For more information email studyabroad@swinburne.edu.au

The Residential College (Hawthorn)

Each of these rooms has a single bed, a built-in desk with bookshelf, a sink and vanity cupboard, an electric jug, desk, lamp, telephone, broadband internet connection, ergonomic study chair and a visitors' chair. The 2010 fees are A\$270–A\$300 per week.

Student Residence Apartments (Hawthorn)

These partly furnished apartments offer independent living and are particularly suited to senior students or to those who have lived away from home before. The fees in 2010 are A\$205–A\$265 per week.

Lilydale Student Village

These fully furnished modern apartments within walking distance of the train station and local shops. The fees in 2010 are A\$160–A\$220 per week, including utilities.

Homestay

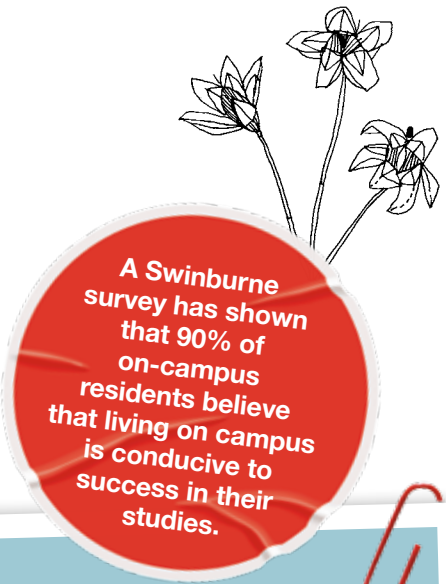
Homestay means living with a local family or resident. The student lives as a guest in the home and it is a great way for students to experience an Australian lifestyle. Homestay includes three meals per day, a furnished bedroom, electricity, gas and water. Hot dinners are prepared by the host. The cost per week is A\$265 plus a A\$230 placement fee. Private rental and share accommodation

You could choose to rent your own apartment, or share a two- or three-room rental house or apartment with other students. We recommend that if you are seeking this type of accommodation you choose a short-term accommodation option for when you first arrive. Share accommodation vacancies can easily be found online at the Swinburne Student Housing Database: www.swinaccomm.visualeyes.net.au

In 2010, the average cost of share accommodation in Hawthorn and the inner city is A\$130–A\$170 per week for a room, plus utilities (gas, electricity and water) of approximately A\$20 per week.

Swinburne International can provide you with advice on location, and a reference letter confirming your enrolment at Swinburne. Remember that setting up your own apartment or house will also mean furnishing it, so you'll need to budget for that. Living costs

Melbourne is an affordable place to study abroad. Living costs vary depending on your lifestyle and the type of accommodation you choose. There are many places to buy cheap, fresh food and endless free activities and events for students.

We recommend you budget A\$1700 for each month you intend to study in Melbourne. Here is a sample of Melbourne prices*:

 - Loaf of bread: \$3.00–\$4.00
 - Espresso coffee: \$3.00–\$3.50
 - Can of Coke: \$2.00
 - Big Mac: \$4.45
 - Take out main meal: \$8.00–\$15.00
 - Daily newspaper: \$1.50
 - Student movie ticket: \$15.00

Studying at Swinburne



Program your own studies

As a study abroad student you can study at Swinburne for one or two semesters and may begin your studies in either Semester 1 or Semester 2. You are required to take a full-time study load, which is between 37.5 and 50 credit points per semester. Most Swinburne units are 12.5 credit points, so you will take either three or four units per semester.

Enhance your study abroad experience

Students participating in the Study Abroad Certificate of Specialisation program (see below) will be enrolled full-time at Swinburne studying a minimum of three units.

To complete the Study Abroad Certificate of Specialisation, you must complete two units from the approved list of majors. For a dual specialisation, two units from each of two academic majors are required. Individual units will be approved in accordance with prerequisite selection criteria and previous studies.

English language programs

Students from non-English speaking backgrounds may wish to undertake some preparatory English language studies before commencing their study abroad program. Fees will vary depending on the length of the program. For more information go to: www.international.swinburne.edu.au/courses/elicos

Swinburne's teaching style

Classes at Swinburne are taught using a number of styles. Lectures are held each week and students are given an overview of the week's materials. Tutorials are an opportunity for students to meet in smaller groups to discuss the lecture material. Laboratory sessions are held for some units to enable students to gain practical knowledge of their academic area.

Studio classes are used for design students to develop their ideas.

Assessment takes various forms. Generally students will be assessed by a combination of assignments, examinations, practicals and presentations.

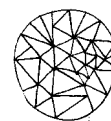
Swinburne academic terminology

Course: A Swinburne program of study. Most Swinburne undergraduate courses are three to five years in duration.

Unit of Study (Unit): The individual subjects or modules of study taken as part of a course.

Prerequisite: Units or requirements that must be completed in order to take further units at Swinburne.

Credit Points: Swinburne units have a credit-point value (CP). Most units are 12.5 CP. A 50 CP study load is the maximum full-time study load per semester.

Student support services

Academic support

An academic skills session is held for study abroad students in the first two to three weeks of semester. In addition to this, the Language and Academic Skills (LAS) unit runs workshops throughout the semester to assist students in developing the necessary skills and techniques to achieve their academic goals. Students can also make individual appointments with the LAS advisers.

Learning facilities

Study abroad students have access to Swinburne library services across all campuses. Swinburne libraries provide information resources, information literacy training and information access services. All campuses also have computer labs with printing facilities available 24 hours a day.

Keep in touch online

Swinburne students receive weekly email updates with information about academic and extracurricular events and dates to remember. The Blackboard site also keeps you updated and provides discussion boards. The Swinburne student blog allows you to keep up with what fellow students are doing across all our campuses.

Pre-departure and arrival services

Free airport pick-up

All study abroad students have access to the free airport pick-up service on arrival at Melbourne International Airport. The service will deliver you to your temporary or permanent accommodation.

The Swinburne Abroad Advisers will be your first point of contact when you arrive at Swinburne. They provide comprehensive support and service to all study abroad students.

Welcome hour

The Swinburne Abroad Office provides one-hour sessions for study abroad students in the week prior to orientation. These sessions allow you to start getting your bearings on campus, collect some information and meet other students.

Orientation

A specific orientation is held for study abroad students to equip you with all the information necessary for a successful study abroad experience. The program also includes an excursion for study abroad students.

SwinMates mentor program

You will have the opportunity to be matched to a local Swinburne student as your mentor for the semester. The SwinMates welcome session is held in the first week of semester. SwinMates events are organised throughout the semester.

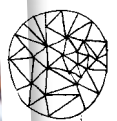


“In my course in Germany my focus is on graphic design. But while I’m in Australia I would like to gain a new perspective in the area of multimedia and web design to enhance my degree.

HAM 113 Professional Communication Practice (Hawthorn campus)

HAT 110 Australia: A Global Context (Hawthorn campus)

This is a general elective unit that offers a concise introduction to Australia's history, culture and politics. It has a particular emphasis on examining Australia's changing place within the global community. This unit provides a basic overview of Australian history; discusses some of the key icons of Australian identity; and explores Australian politics, its issues, parties and personalities.

LIN 100 Aboriginal Australia: Victorian People, Places and Experiences (Lilydale campus)

Indigenous issues in Australia continue to be at the centre of public discussions on national identity and history, as well as political, legal, health and education systems.

The unit provides you with an understanding of Australia's Indigenous peoples and the issues that define their experiences as Australian citizens. You will be encouraged to examine the role of Australian citizens in a contemporary multicultural and multinational society, and to develop and practise broader thinking in issues of inter-cultural relationships.

Entrance requirements

To be eligible for the Study Abroad program you generally must have successfully completed a year of study at a higher education institution. Students who have graduated from high school may be eligible for the Freshman Abroad program and can submit their high school results.

Individual course units may have prerequisites, and selection will be based on previous studies.

Students from institutions teaching in languages other than English must provide evidence of language proficiency.

- IELTS: 6.0 overall (no band score below 6.0).
- Paper-based TOEFL: 550 (minimum TWE 5).
- Internet-based TOEFL: 68 (no band score below 18).
- Applicants from Denmark, Finland, Norway and Sweden may provide secondary school English results.

- Applicants from Germany may provide DAAD: a minimum of 'B' in all four skill areas, plus Abitur/Fachhochschulreife English results of 7/3.0 in the final three years of secondary school.

- US students are expected to have a GPA of 2.6 or higher.

Health insurance

Australian Government regulations require all international students studying in Australia to take out Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC). When you pay your fees, Swinburne will arrange OSHC for you. In 2011 the cost for a single person will be A\$210 for six months or A\$420 for 12 months.

Under a reciprocal government agreement, Swedish and Norwegian students are not required to have OSHC.



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
